Those who helped to remove the scrub and nurture the ground that now accommodates a fine 18-hole course can feel their pioneering efforts were justified. Kilaben Bay Club, as it was then named, was affiliated with the Newcastle District Golf Association in 1961. It took many more years of work to transform the course into a full 18-hole layout.

Junior Golf Star




